

LAUGHTER & RISK-TAKING: A COMICAL ADVENTURE IN ACHIEVING GOALS

Grade Level: 3rd & 4th Grade

Standards Addressed:

Third Grade:

Subject: English Language Arts

Duration: 60 minutes

Lesson Objective:

Students will explore the importance of taking calculated risks to achieve their goals by examining humorous stories from **The Manhood Manual – A Comic Adventure** and applying the learned lessons to their own lives.

Materials:

- The Manhood Manual A Comic Adventure
- The Manhood Manual Press Release (attached)
- The Manhood Manual Risk-Taking Comic Page (attached)
- Whiteboard or blackboard
- Dry erase markers or chalk
- Large sheets of paper
- Writing and coloring materials

Lesson Procedure:

- I. Introduction (5 minutes)
 - Write "Humorous Risks and Fun Goals" on the board.
 - Initiate a short conversation with students about the meaning of risks and goals and how humor can help us learn from our mistakes.
 - Discuss how risk-taking can lead to success, failure or something in between and this is perfectly fine.
 - Discuss some famous risk-takers such as:
 - Michael Jordan (born 1963) **Risk-taking:** Jordan was cut from his high school basketball team but persisted in his passion for the sport. **Successes:** A six-time NBA champion, five-time NBA MVP, and two-time Olympic gold medalist; widely regarded as one of the greatest basketball players of all time.

- Steve Jobs (1955-2011) Risk-taking: Jobs dropped out of college, cofounded Apple, and was later fired from the company. He returned to Apple after founding NeXT and Pixar. **Successes**: Jobs revolutionized the tech industry, creating iconic products such as the iPhone, iPod, and MacBook.
- Henry Ford (1863-1947) **Risk-taking:** Ford faced multiple business failures before founding the Ford Motor Company. **Successes:** Developed the assembly line technique for mass production, revolutionizing the automobile industry and making cars more affordable.
- Walt Disney (1901–1966) **Risk-taking:** Disney started several unsuccessful animation studios before creating the Disney Brothers Studio with his brother Roy. Successes: Established The Walt Disney Company, which has since become a world-renowned entertainment company.

2. Reading and Analysis (20 minutes)

- Split students into small groups.
- Introduce The Manhood Manual A Comic Adventure by reading the The Manhood Manual Press Release.
- Assign each group an amusing, age-appropriate story from The Manhood Manual - A Comic Adventure featuring Jeffrey taking a risk and learning a lesson.
- Instruct students to read the story and discuss the following questions within their groups:
 - What was the amusing risk Jeffrey took?
 - What comical mistake did he make?
 - What lesson did he learn?
 - How can this lesson be applied to your own life?

3. Group Presentations (20 minutes)

- Each group will present their story, the amusing risk taken, the comical mistake made, and the lesson learned.
- Encourage groups to act out the amusing scenes from their stories to engage their classmates and emphasize the humor.

4. Goal Setting and Risk-taking Activity (10 minutes)

- Ask each student to consider a goal they want to achieve or a skill they want to learn.
- Instruct students to write down their goal and one calculated risk they can take to achieve it, while incorporating a funny twist to their plan.
- Encourage students to think about the humorous lessons learned from Jeffrey's stories and how they can apply those lessons to their own risk-taking.

5. Wrap-up and Reflection (5 minutes)

- As a class, discuss the significance of taking calculated risks in life and how humor can help us learn from our mistakes and grow.
- Encourage students to share their fun goals and the amusing risks they plan to take with their classmates or friends for support and laughter.

Assessment:

Students will be assessed based on their group presentations, participation in discussions, and their written goals and risk-taking plans with a humorous twist.

Extension Activities:

- Invite students to create their own comic strips illustrating the amusing risks they plan to take and the potential lessons they may learn (attached).
- Read more entertaining stories from The Manhood Manual A Comic Adventure and discuss the risks and lessons in those stories.

• Encourage students to set goals and take risks in other aspects of their lives, such as academics, sports, or relationships, and have them reflect on their experiences in a journal or during class discussions, focusing on the humor they find in the process.
